Two days after Gov. Chris Christie unveiled his austere state budget for fiscal 2015, school districts yesterday got their first look at how more than \$9 billion in state aid will be distributed next year.







Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers

PARCC

- Upgrade of infrastructure for K-12

The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) is a consortium of 22 states plus the U.S. Virgin Islands working together to develop a common set of K-12 assessments in English and math anchored in what it takes to be ready for college and careers. These new K-12 assessments will build a pathway to college and career readiness by the end of high school, mark students' progress toward this goal from 3rd grade up, and provide teachers with timely information to inform instruction and provide student support. The PARCC assessments will be ready for states to administer during the 2014-15 school year.

PARCC will use technology throughout the design and implementation of the assessment system. The overall assessment system design will include a mix of constructed response items, performance-based tasks, and computer-enhanced, computer-scored items. The PARCC assessments will be administered via computer, and a combination of automated scoring and human scoring will be employed.

Teaching and learning in the Elizabeth Public Schools continues to be enhanced significantly through the use of technology.

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



Over a 17 Year Period - from 1997-2014




The City of Elizabeth Tax Levy increased by \$95 Million during the period of 1997-2014
