Parent Tips

HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILD WITH READING

Reading with your child isn't just about sounding out words—it's also about understanding. Help build your child's comprehension by discussing the story before, during, and after reading. Ask open-ended questions like "What do you think will happen next?" or "Why do you think the character did that?" Re-reading favorite books and making connections to real-life experiences can deepen their understanding and build confidence.

Know your IEP

BUZZ WORDS

Understanding the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) terms helps you make informed decisions as a member of the IEP team. Know these terms and don't hesitate to ask for clarification if in doubt.

LRE (Least Restrictive Environment)

Students learn with nondisabled peers as much as appropriate, with supports before considering other settings. This can be quantified with a percentage of time your student spends with general education peers.

Related Services

Supports like speech, occupational therapy, physical therapy, counseling, paraprofessional aide, and transportation that help your child access learning.

PLAAFP (Present Levels of Academic Achievement and Functional Performance)

This explains how your student is doing right now-strengths, needs and how the disability affects learning and participation. This is based on evaluations and classroom performance. It is the starting point for setting annual goals and services.
