

JVJ Student STEM Research Scholar

Students in **JVJ STEM Academy** had the opportunity to participate in the 2022 Group Summer Scholars Research Program (GSSRP). To encourage these STEM endeavors, student Ilyssa Jimenez, a student in Mrs. Jain's Biology Class, was selected from a large pool of applicants for Kean University's GSSRP program. Participants work alongside faculty and staff on cutting-edge research projects in Analytical Chemistry, Scientific Visualization, Cancer Biology, Machine Learning, Developmental Biology, and Modern Drug Discovery.

Ilyssa worked with Dr. Salvatore Coniglio to investigate the presence of Osteopontin in Glioma Treated THP-1 Cells. Her research focused on Glioblastoma, a deadly type of brain cancer for which current treatment options are limited. The research team was investigating the cellular distribution of Osteopontin. Ilyssa gained valuable experience and got motivated to select Biomedical Science Class here in STEM academy and is currently a student in principles of Biomedical Science class in JVJ Stem Academy. Ilyssa plans on pursuing a medical career with the skills she is learning at JVJ Stem Academy

Upon completion of the program, participants gained valuable technical skills and research experience, learned to work as part of a research team, developed a true appreciation of the scientific research process, and contributed firsthand to the acquisition of new scientific knowledge. Italian American Police Society


Christopher Columbus School No. 15 was chosen by the Italian American Police Society as the recipient of their annual back-to-school fundraiser.

Special Guests Welcome Students to School No. 9






Oh! The Places Flat Mrs. Taub Went!
