




#### William F. Halloron School No. 22

# One Hundredth Day of School



# African American female artist, Faith Ringgold, Inspires Students

All second-grade students, at **Terence C. Reilly School No.** 7 were introduced to the African American female artist, Faith Ringgold, in Ms. Greene's art class through her story telling, quilt making, and biography of her life. Students learned that Faith's passion for quilt making was a family legacy passed down from her enslaved ancestor. Faith's mother, a fashion designer, encouraged Faith to use fabrics around her painting's edges, reinforcing that quilting medium.

Students listened to the story titled *Tar Beach* and learned about Faith's message, which is "how important it is to follow your dreams". Students learned about the places important to the character "Cassie Lightfoot" in her community along with the fun evenings she had on the rooftop with her family and neighbors that they called *Tar Beach*. Students shared some of the places that are either important to them or places they enjoy with their own families visually by illustrating their own paper quilt square. In the story, the George Washington Bridge is a symbol of importance because Cassie's father helped to build the bridge. The class also discussed the bridge close to the school, the Goethals Bridge, and how it connects the City of Elizabeth to the neighboring city of Staten Island, NY. Students not only worked independently on their quilt square, but also together as a whole when drawing and rendering the Goethals bridge.

In 2010, Ms. Greene had the fortunate experience of being able to create an evening event for Reilly students and their families at the Montclair Art Museum. Faith Ringgold appeared live to speak about her work and "Tar Beach" was part of the exhibit. Reilly students had worked on a similar project that year and it was a great honor to meet Faith in person and have her sign personal copies of "Tar Beach". This year in Ms. Greene's fashion design class, Amelia De Los Santos and MaKayla Valentine were extremely interested in designing, sewing, and art, making various costumes and props for all school performance-based events. They not only created some of the costumery for the "Sneak Peak" Lion King show, but also created this amazing sunflower fabric based on "Faith Ringgold's" painting titled: Sunflower Quilting Bee at Arles, painted in 1991. This painting shows eight powerful African American women from the past and present displaying a colorful quilt that is a communal symbol of their achievements. From upper left they are Madam Walker, Sojourner Truth, Ida Wells, Fannie Lou Hamer, Harriet Tubman, Rosa Parks, Mary McLeod Bethune, and Ella Baker. A ninth figure, on the lower left, is Willia Marie Simone, a fictional character created by the artist. Vincent van Gogh, well known for his paintings of sunflowers, stands to the right.

Amelia and MaKayla worked hard to replicate the quilt that these famous women in this painting were sewing to be used in the interpretive dance routine that Ms. Miller choreographed for the show.

Board President Iliana Chevres visited the Autism program and had the opportunity to observe students in their Art Class. The students were actively engaged in a Black History project. When she walked into the room she was greeted warmly by the students – many of whom remembered her from past experiences. The students happily showed her the project they were working on and shared how much they enjoyed the activity. She also had an opportunity to visit the Life Skills classroom where she could see all the job-related and transitional activities that the students perform daily. These activities include laundry, dishes, popcorn sales, coffee cart, cooking, and cleaning.

Ms. Chevres proceeded to visit a Biology Honors class. She was impressed by how the students collaborated in setting up the lab to extract DNA from a model. Students explained that each triad group received a bag containing different types of material. The students' job was to design a model of DNA.

The Board President also visited a Business Economics class where students were actively completing a table of production and cost data to understand how costs of production affect prices. Ms. Chevres then proceeded to a US History II class. Students parsed through President Woodrow Wilson's Fourteen Point Plan, evaluating its purpose and efficacy. This lesson was meant to fortify students' argument building skills and illustrate how the effects of World War I contributed to later historical developments.






