


Elizabeth Public Schools Celebrate Women's History Month and International Women's Day





Alma Woodsey Thomas, American Painter is known for expressionistic abstract art. She was born on September 22, 1891, and died on February 24, 1978, in Washington DC. She studied at Howard University and Columbia University. She graduated in 1924 as the university's first fine arts graduate. She was the first African American woman to have a retrospective at the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York City. The painting called "Resurrection" by Alma Thomas is part of the White House collection of artworks and the first in this collection by an African American woman.

Benjamin Franklin School No. 13

Each week during Women's History Month, while sharing the morning announcements, students learned about women that have been instrumental in our country. Students learned about June Bacon-Bercey, first African American on-air meteorologist. June Bacon-Bercey was a science reporter and radar meteorologist. She later became a teacher, teaching elementary and high school math and science classes.

In honor of Irish Heritage Month, Susan Collins, Senator of Maine, and Molly Brown, "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" were highlighted for their great accomplishments. Susan Collins has the distinction of being the longest tenured Republican woman currently in the senate. Molly Brown was noted for her actions during the sinking of the Titanic.

Students also learned about Mabel G. Holmes, who was the first African American principal in 1949, serving the Elizabeth Public School District in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth. She was appointed to the school board as its first African American member and one of the Elizabeth school buildings is named in her honor, Mabel G. Holmes School No. 5.




I Stand with Ukraine

Focusing on Supportive Learning Environments





Friends Care, Friends Share



Nicholas S. LaCorte-Peterstown School No. 3




Terence C. Reilly School No. 7

Read Across America was celebrated with activities which included a Character Parade, a visit from Dr. Seuss,


many guest readers, and themed-dress days for students, faculty, and staff.







Madison-Monroe School No. 16

Nicholas M. Butler School No. 23





John E. Dwyer Technology Academy & Robert Morris School No. 18












Sir Cumference


Multiplication is an important standard from third grade and on; making it fun is the best way to learn facts.




persevere through the rest of the school year.
