Dear Elizabeth Public Schools Learning Community:

The unprecedented damage caused by the remnants of Hurricane Ida has caused devastating hardship and loss for countless residents throughout the State of New Jersey, including many in the Elizabeth community. As a result of the storm, the Elizabeth Board of Education held an emergency meeting on Thursday, September 2 using an online platform technology to discuss and provide an emergency status update pertaining to the operations of the school district.

Please be advised of the following updates that pertain to the start of the 2021-2022 school year:

Delayed Opening of Schools

During the emergency Elizabeth Board of Education meeting, the Board approved a delayed opening of school for the 2021-2022 school year to **Tuesday, September 14**. The delayed opening was approved following discussion of the impact of the storm on members of the Elizabeth community in conjunction with the impact on the district's facilities. Our instructional team members will be reporting back on Monday, September 13.

Governor Visits City of Elizabeth

Governor Phil Murphy visited the City of Elizabeth on Friday, September 3 to tour the damage that took place throughout the greater community. Mayor J. Christian Bollwage joined the governor in visiting areas of the city that were significantly affected. In addition, I briefed Governor Murphy on the status of our schools.

Virtual Instruction for School Nos. 26 and 27

As a result of extensive damage at Dr. Orlando Edreira Academy School No. 26 on South Elmora Avenue and Dr. Anotnia Pantoja School No. 27 on Morris Avenue, students attending those schools will begin the school year in virtual instruction. Updates will be provided pertaining to the remediation process of these facilities and when students and team members will be able to return to their buildings for in-person instruction. A timeline cannot currently be provided as we are continuing to assess the damage to the infrastructure of these facilities to determine the repairs that will be needed.
