


## 2025 Women's History Month Celebration

EBOE President Stanley J. Neron welcomed everyone to the evening event and introduced Board Member Rosa Moreno Ortega who is sponsoring the district's Women's History Month activities and events this month. Moreno Ortega gave remarks about the Women's History Month initiative and introduced some of the schools who were performing for the evening's festivities.

The Board recognized the women team members of Elizabeth Public Schools who have dedicated 40 plus years of service to the district by presenting them each with a Board resolution.

The Board also presented a resolution to former Dr. Linda Caldwell Epps, born and raised in Elizabeth, for her dedication to a lifetime of public and community service through a career in education at Bloomfield College and her extensive work in preserving the history of communities throughout the State of New Jersey while serving as President and CEO of the New Jersey Historical Society and as President and CEO of 1804 Consultants, an organization dedicated to the advancement of educational and cultural organizations.

### John E. Dwyer Technology Academy

Students from the National Art Honor Society are creating a stunning mosaic style mural featuring the American Goldfinch (Spinus tristis), New Jersey's official state bird. This project is more than just an artistic endeavor. It is part of an immersive learning experience that connects students to nature through birdwatching, conservation, and citizen science. As they bring the mural to life, students have been using the Merlin Bird ID and eBird apps to deepen their understanding of local and global bird species while actively participating in citizen science. By recording their bird sightings, they are contributing valuable data to scientists studying bird populations and migration patterns. While they have not yet spotted a Goldfinch, they have observed a variety of other birds in the area, including cardinals, sparrows, starlings, crows, hawks, and Canada geese, to name a few. These sightings have given them a greater appreciation for the diversity of birdlife around them and have inspired their artistic process.



Though it is still a work in progress, the mural is already an eye-catching addition to the school. The final elements, including the title and bird's name, will complete this tribute to New Jersey's rich birdlife. Beyond its visual impact, the project serves as a lasting reminder of the importance of art, nature, and community engagement.
