Association of Sewing and Design Professionals (ASDP) Lifetime Achievement Award

John E. Dwyer Technology Academy English as a Second Language teacher Vandarra Robbins was awarded the Association of Sewing and Design Professionals (ASDP) Lifetime Achievement Award at its annual Education Conference on October 22 in Baltimore, MD.

Vandarra first made a mark on the sewing world by co-founding the Northeast NJ Chapter of the American Sewing Guild and launching East Coast Sewing Associates, an association committed to sewing education. They conducted sewing workshops and conferences, bringing in sewing experts from around the country for the benefit of the sewing public. She would become a member of the Professional Association of Custom Clothiers (PACC, now the ASDP) and the newly formed NJ Chapter, in both of which she remains active and passionate about proper sewing techniques and educating others. She has devoted her entire career to improving not only her own sewing skills but those who enter her sphere of influence.

Before joining Elizabeth Public Schools, Vandarra was the creative director at Handler Textiles Corporation, an interfacing

manufacturer, for which she was responsible for all aspects of product development and educating consumers and retailers on the proper use of the company's products. She also served as a resident sewing expert at the McCall Pattern Company, during which she influenced sewing techniques used for patterns and development of pattern instructions that helped guide an entire generation of home sewers.

She served as President of the NJ Chapter of ASDP for 12 years, developing a jurying program for the chapter so members could improve and verify their sewing skills. She even gave classes on specific techniques such as bound buttonholes that members would encounter in the jurying process. This program subsequently became part of the foundation for the current ASDP's Master Sewing and Design Professional (MSDP) and Master Alteration Specialist (MAS) certification programs.

She continues to promote sewing education, working hard to get an after school sewing club off the ground while also continuing to teach sewing in her home studio.



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


All Things Fall


After students viewed the matinee performance of *Hamilton*, AHPA students engaged in a question-and-
