Elizabeth Public Schools had the honor of hosting representatives of the crew of the USS New Jersey, a new Virginia-class attack submarine set to be commissioned in the next year. As the birthplace of the US Navy's first submarine, Elizabeth holds a special place in naval history.

On April 3rd, the captain and crew met with students and team members from Juan Pablo Duarte - José Julián Martí School No. 28, which is next to the site of America's first submarine launch. While there, they answered students' questions, met with elected officials, received resolutions from local and state representatives, and were entertained by a student performance.

On April 4th, the USS New Jersey crew met with US Marine Corps ROTC students from Admiral William F. Halsey Jr. Health and Public Safety Academy to address more student questions and



discuss careers in the US Navy. This was followed by a beautifully catered lunch provided by Mr. Paul Conte and the students from Thomas A. Edison Academy for Career & Technical Education.

Friendly Lion Cafe









Bilingual Learners Score High

This year the **Alexander Hamilton Preparatory Academy** world language department provided the opportunity for 11th and 12th grade students to voluntarily sign up for the STAMP exam. The STAMP exam is a bilingual proficiency test that is offered and recognized internationally in a multitude of languages. This year, 66 students volunteered to be tested and passed the exam in seven different languages which include French, Haitian Creole, Italian, Portuguese (Brazilian), Spanish, Russian, Ukrainian. Passing the STAMP exam qualifies students to be eligible for the NJ Seal of Biliteracy on their diploma upon graduation.

Swing Night

An interdisciplinary unit on jazz was implemented with the third graders of **Dr. Orlando Edreira Academy School No. 26** @ **31**. Music, Library, Physical Education and Art teachers introduced a



variety of lessons inspired by elements of jazz music and swing dance. These activities culminated in an evening of swing dancing and music hosted by the third graders, called *Swing Night*.

With the guidance of a professional dance instructor, students learned how to swing dance in Physical Education class. Along with its basic history, students learned the fundamental elements of form and pattern of jazz music in Music class. In Art class, they learned about artists influenced by the jazz music movement and the human body, and how color and line can illustrate rhythm and sound. Students read about famous jazz musicians, such as Louie Armstrong, Ella Fitzgerald, and Benny Goodman in Library class. Students also took a trip to the Newark Museum to look at the history of American art that coincided with the era of Jazz. Students had to fill out job applications to be considered for the job of a maître d, manager, bartender, waiter, or kitchen helper at the museum. The Advanced Jazz Band also performed for the "Swing Night" event. This unit captures the spirit of the collaborative work environment here at Dr. Orlando Edreira Academy and shows how a child's education can be brought to life.









Vocabulary Parade

At **Nicholas Murray Butler School No. 23,** both the main and the annex had a vocabulary parade. Each student had to pick a word and make a visual of it. On the day of the parade, the students and teachers wore their word for all to see. What a great way to highlight their words. There were some highly creative outfits.





Dwyer Students and Team Members Celebrate Ramadan

John E. Dwyer Technology Academy's Muslim students shared their religious traditions with the school community and shared greetings everyone can say to express heartfelt wishes for Ramadan - Ramadan Kareem or Ramadan Mubarak and Eid Mubarak. Students also posted a flag, calendar, and

symbols that represent the holiday.

Ramadan is a special time of the year for Muslims around the world. It is the ninth month in the Islamic lunar calendar and is the month in which the Holy Quran was revealed to Prophet Muhammad (PBUH). It is a time for reflection, worship, charity, prayer, and fasting. Each day, Muslims fast from sunrise to sunset. They wake up for a predawn meal called "suhoor" and break their fast at sunset with a dinner meal called "iftar." It is customary for Muslims to break their fast with a date as did Prophet Muhammad (PBUH). In addition, Muslims look forward to Ramadan to host gatherings with their family and friends and serve their favorite dishes.



At night, once the five daily prayers are completed, Muslims also participate in extra prayers called "taraweeh." These extra prayers and other acts of worship are ways for Muslims to increase their connection to God. It is believed that those who perform these acts of worship will have their sins from the past year forgiven.

At the end of the month, Muslims celebrate *Eid Al Fitr*, a three-day holiday to celebrate the end of Ramadan. "Eid" in Arabic means holiday or celebration and "Fitr" means *break the fast*. During this time, Muslims celebrate by performing the special Eid prayer on the first day. They wear new clothes, give each other gifts, sometimes in the form of money called "eideya," visit family and friends, etc.

Celebrating Ramadan

Prior to Ramadan, **Benjamin Franklin School No. 13** recognized the holiday by sharing breakfast with team members. Also, there was school-wide read-aloud for grades K-2 *Ramadan Is Here* and *What Is Ramadan* for grades 3-8. Facts About Ramadan were shared by team members along with students. During the morning announcements, students reflected on ways to reduce stress and anxiety for those celebrating the season of Ramadan. What a wonderful way to learn about the Muslim culture.

On April 3rd, Assistant Superintendent for Teaching and Learning, Dr. Jennifer Cedeño visited **Mabel G. 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
