
Market Day

Italian-American Heritage Month



Learning the History of Italian Americans

Mr. Morsella from **Elizabeth High School** – **Frank J. Cicarell Academy** celebrated Italian American Heritage with his AP Italian Class this month by having his students participate in an Italian Immigration Role Play. Students were able to understand the history of immigration patterns of Italians in New Jersey in the broader context of immigration patterns in American History at the turn of the century. Students played the role of a padrone, or a work agent who is trying to recruit Italians to take jobs in New Jersey. Through the role playing, students were able to create dialogue to answer the following Italian American questions.

- Where did the Italian immigrants land in the USA?
- Why are so many people from Europe immigrating to the USA at this time in history?
- Where were the most Italians settling in NJ in 1890?
- Why do you think they chose Passaic, Essex, and Hudson counties?
- Why do you think the Italians chose to settle in Atlantic County?
- What were they coming to America looking for?

"¡Tierra! ¡Tierra!"

What words were likely said on Columbus' ships when land was spotted? If you guessed, "iTierra! iTierra!" you could be a student in Mrs. Phyllis Taub's fifth-grade classroom at **Madison-Monroe School No. 16**.

Students considered the Spanish background of Columbus' crew as they read and acted out (with costumes!) the historical fiction novel Pedro's Journal. The book tells the story of Pedro, a young boy, who sailed on Columbus' maiden voyage across the Atlantic. Students learned geography and history, and also had opportunities to pretend to be cartographers as they mapped out the voyages to the new world. Class discussions



gave students the opportunity to discuss Columbus' legacy. Books are always more fun to read when their readers can make them come to life.



Discovering Italy

Kindergarten students in Mrs. Martinez and Ms. Cuccio's class, from **Elmora School No. 12**, honored *Italian Heritage Month* by learning about Italy's historic culture, recipes, and geography of well-known monuments and churches.

You've Got a Friend in Me



Spreading Kindness


