Welcome back to Elizabeth Public Schools for the 2022-2023 school year!

As our students, team members, and families return for another year of teaching and learning, it is vital that we continue to build upon our successes from 2021-2022. In September 2021, when we welcomed back the entire learning community from some form of virtual learning for the first time in 18 months, it was our goal to reclaim excellence by reintroducing many of the academic, athletic, and artistic opportunities that had been altered or eliminated the previous school year to create a greater sense of normalcy.

Thanks to the tremendous efforts of the entire learning community, that goal was achieved and the Elizabeth Public Schools standard of excellence has been reaffirmed. In academics, athletics, and the arts, our students and team members once again achieved at the highest levels as we had increasingly grown accustomed to over the past several years.

We had schools that were ranked among the best at the elementary and middle school levels and the most challenging at the high school level. One of our schools was awarded the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award by College Board for their work in closing the gender gap in AP Computer Science Principles while another was recognized by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture as the first-place winner of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program's Very Impressive Produce (VIP) Award.

Several of our sports teams performed at a championship level with boys soccer earning a North 2. Group 4 state championship, boys basketball winning the North 2. Group 4 and Group 4 state titles along with a trip to the final four of the last ever Tournament of Champions. the winter boys track and field 4 x 800 relay team winning the Union County Relays, Group 4 State Relays, and Emerging Elite National Championship at the Nike Indoor Nationals. The girls softball team, consisting largely of underclassmen, nearly earned a championship of their own in reaching the Union County Tournament finals.

Elizabeth Public Schools was awarded the Best Communities for Music Education by the NAMM Foundation for the third year in a row and the sixth time in the past seven years and received a \$22,000 Intro to Music Grant from Sound Start Foundation, in partnership with the Save the Music Foundation, to help boost music education programs at the K-5 grade levels. The EHS Marching Band added to its decorated history with the 2021 NJMBDA Class AAA State Championship while the EHS Winter Color Guard won three Mid-Atlantic Indoor Network (MAIN) Class Scholastic A competitions in their return to competitive action after a decades-long absence.

In the pages ahead, you will see some of these highlights of excellence being reaffirmed at Elizabeth Public Schools. I look forward to working alongside our dedicated Board members, outstanding team members, and valued family and community members to help our students achieve excellence in the classroom, on the playing fields, and on the performance stage again in 2022-2023.





Registration — Early Childhood Classes

The Elizabeth Board of Education offers free, high quality, full day, age and developmentally appropriate preschool and kindergarten classes to all eligible Elizabeth children. To enroll in preschool, a child must live in Elizabeth with his or her parent/guardian and reach the age of either three or four on or before October 1st. To enroll in kindergarten, a child must also live in Elizabeth with his or her parent or guardian and must celebrate his or her fifth birthday on or before October 1st.

In addition to regular full day preschool classes, the Elizabeth Board of Education also provides extended day and extended year programs for three and four-year-olds at specific sites throughout the city. For more information on these programs, please call the Office of Early Childhood Education at 908-436-5353.

Registration dates for pre-kindergarten and kindergarten students are published in all of the area's newspapers each year and are featured on the local cable network's Community Bulletin Board. You may also call the Office of Early Childhood Education for registration dates, times, and locations. You will need the documents listed below to register your child.

School Security

For the welfare of all students and staff members, all visitors, who wish to enter school buildings during the arrival/dismissal periods, must wait until all students have entered/departed the building before entering and proceeding to the main office to sign in. All visitors must have an appointment. School staff members will issue visitor passes and arrange for teachers to meet with parents/guardians. Please be aware that metal detectors are in use in all of our schools to safeguard the safety and well-being of our students, staff, and visitors.

District Crisis Plan

The Elizabeth School District maintains a comprehensive Crisis Management Plan designed to provide administrators, teachers, parents and students with specific guidelines to follow in the event of any type of emergency situation. Each school also has its own plan that includes information specific to the school such as designated evacuation sites and emergency phone chains. Please contact your child's school with questions relevant to the district or the school's Crisis Plan.

Emergency School Closings

Announcements regarding school closings or delayed openings due to inclement weather or any other emergency situation will be made using the BlackBoard Connect electronic messaging system and will be available on the following Emergency School Closing stations:

In the event of an emergency that may require school closing, parents may also call the main phone numbers of their child's school. If schools are to be closed or if a delayed opening is planned, each principal will record a message to this effect that can be retrieved by anyone calling the school's main phone number. We request that parents and students not call police headquarters, City Hall, the radio or television stations listed above, or Board of Education offices for emergency closing information.

Emergency Student Information

In the event of a medical emergency or any other event that necessitates immediate contact with parents or guardians, schools must have on file a current address and current phone numbers (home, business, cell, etc.) for every one of their students, as well as the phone number of a friend or family member who will know how to contact the student's parent/guardian if an emergency does arise. If you move or change jobs,



please remember to update your child's school records and emergency information as soon as possible. A form can be found on the district website.

No treatment beyond first aid can be given at any hospital or doctor's office without a parent or legal guardian's consent. Any delay in reaching you could prove hazardous to your child's health.

Medications

Students may not carry medication with them during the school day. Any student who must receive medication during school hours must have the medication handcarried to the school nurse by his/her parent or guardian. The medication must be in the original pharmacy container and must be accompanied by a note from the child's physician indicating why, how, and when the medication should be given.

In keeping with the district's Crisis Management Plan, if a child has a condition, such as diabetes or epilepsy, that can be life-threatening without the timely administration of the proper medication, his/her parents/guardians are asked to discuss this situation with the school nurse so that the proper precautions can be taken in the event of an emergency situation.

Health Policies

It is the responsibility of school authorities to protect the school population from the spread of communicable diseases while at the same time making every effort to minimize the loss of school time by the involved students. Do not send your child to school with an unexplained rash, or if your child complains of a headache, fever, upset stomach, runny nose, or other cold-related symptoms, or if he/she doesn't appear to be in good health. Consult your physician for a diagnosis. Also, please notify the school if your child is absent because of a communicable disease so that we may safeguard the health of other students.

Physical Examinations and Health Screenings

According to New Jersey Administrative Code 6A:16-2, students should have a physical examination at least one time during each developmental stage. These stages are described as the early childhood stage (preschool through the third grade), the preadolescent stage (the fourth through the sixth grade), and the adolescent stage (the seventh through the twelfth grade). Each of these examinations is to be done by the student's own doctor, nurse practitioner, or clinical nurse specialist. Reports concerning these examinations must be recorded on the Elizabeth Public Schools' Health Record Form and must be submitted to the school nurse. These forms are available through each school's medical office.

If a student doesn't have a family doctor or healthcare provider, a school physician will perform the student's medical examination in a district school health office after the student's parent/guardian signs a form indicating that this is the case. Parents are invited

to be present at these examinations and may contact the school nurse for the date and time of their child's exam. Students must receive a physical examination from a physician or healthcare provider within one year prior to their initial entry into the Elizabeth Public Schools. Students who have not submitted documentation verifying they have received their initial physical examination prior to their first day upon entering the school district will not be permitted to attend school.

According to law, every student between the ages of ten and eighteen is screened for scoliosis every two years. Tuberculin testing is also performed on all students as directed by the New Jersey State Department of Health. If you prefer to have your private physician or healthcare provider perform the scoliosis exam and the tuberculin testing, you must notify your child's school nurse at the beginning of each school year. Health professionals are authorized by the State of New Jersey Department of Health to do dental, vision, hearing and blood pressure screenings for the safety and well being of our students.

Parent Teacher Associations Parent Teacher Organizations

Each school in the Elizabeth School District has either a Parent Teacher Association (PTA) or a Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) that all parents are encouraged to join. For more information about parent organizations, please contact your child's school.

Breakfast and Lunch Programs

The Elizabeth Public Schools' Food and Nutrition Services Department offers breakfast to all students in our district. The free breakfast program has been made available to all our students. We have lunch programs at all schools for students who wish to participate. At each meal, a variety of foods from the four food groups are offered. Free and reduced cost meals are available to all eligible students.

Report Cards

Report cards are issued quarterly. The dates on which these reports can be expected are specified in the calendar pages of this publication.

Wrap Around and After School Programs

The following pre-school classes housed within Neighborhood and Lottery Schools will offer a 7:30 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. Wrap Around Schedule: Schools No. 1, 2, 5, 5A, 7, 16, 21, 22, 26@31, 27, 28, 29, 30, 50, 51, and 52. Pre-school students not participating in the Wrap Around program will follow the regular day schedule which runs from 8:20 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.

Both the District and individual schools sponsor many after-school programs. Information about these programs is available through your child's school office.



Affirmative Action

Special Programs

The Elizabeth Public Schools offer a number of programs geared to meet the special needs of our students. Programs are available in Bilingual Education, English as a Second Language Education, Special Education, Vocational Education, and in Gifted and Talented Education to name just a few. More information on any of these programs is available through your child's school.

In compliance with the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Parents-Right-to-Know, the Elizabeth Board of Education hereby gives public notice that parents may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their children's classroom teachers. This request must be made in writing to the school principal.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and all students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records.

Parents and eligible students have:

- The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days
 of the day the school receives a request for access. The parent or eligible student
 should submit to the school principal or appropriate school official a written request
 that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The school official will make
 arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and
 place where the records may be inspected.
- 2. The right to request the amendment of the student's record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. The parent or eligible student should write the school principal or

- appropriate official, clearly identifying the part of the record they want changed. They should specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise him/her of his/her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- 3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member, including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel, Board of Education members, a person or company with whom the school has contracted to perform a special task such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist, or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the school discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. The school district will forward a copy of the records on request and will forward a copy of the requested records to the parent or eligible student.
- **4.** The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by a school or school district to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:

Notice of Directory Information: Public law also gives access to information about students to educational, occupational, and military recruiters. Parents or students who are eighteen years of age or older may request to have their children's names or their names deleted from the student directory.

Notification of Rights under the Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA)

PPRA affords parents and students who are 18 years of age or emancipated minors



("eligible students"), certain rights regarding a school district's administration of surveys, the collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

Give consent before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the United States Department of Education:

- Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent(s);
- Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
- Sexual behavior or attitudes;
- Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
- Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, physicians, and ministers:
- Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
- Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of:

- Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding;
- Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under State law; and
- Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information obtained from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

Inspect upon request and before administration or use of:

- Protected information surveys of students;
- Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
- Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.

The Elizabeth School District has developed and adopted policies, in consultation with parents, regarding these rights, as well as arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes. The Elizabeth School District will directly notify parents and eligible students of these policies at least annually at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes. The Elizabeth School District will also directly notify parents and eligible students of the specific or approximate dates of the following activities and provide an opportunity to opt a student out of participating in:

- Collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales or other distribution:
- Administration of any protected information survey not funded in whole or in part by the Department of Education; or
- Any non-emergency, invasive physical examination or screening as described above.

Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying

The Elizabeth Board of Education shall maintain a working and learning environment that is free from all forms of harassment, intimidation, or bullying/cyber bullying (EBOE Policy Code 5131.1) on school property, at any school sponsored events, on a school bus or other form of transportation, and via electronic means.

All district employees who have witnessed, or have reliable information, that a staff member or student has been subject to harassment, intimidation or bullying must report the incident to the appropriate school/district office designated by the administration. All other members of the school community, including students, parents, volunteers, and visitors, are encouraged to report any act that may be a violation of this policy. The Board shall not tolerate an act of reprisal or retaliation against any person who reports an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying. Integrated Pest Management Policy

To comply with the New Jersey School Integrated Pest Management Act, this notice alerts all parents, guardians and staff members that the Elizabeth Board of Education has adopted an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Policy and has implemented an IPM Plan at the district level and at each school to comply with this law. IPM is a holistic, preventative approach to managing pests that is explained further in EBOE Policy Code 3510.
