Excellent Opportunities for Elizabeth Students



Dwyer Technology Students Win at Union County College Bridge Building Competition

John Dwyer Technology Academy's Architectural drafting class took several honors at the annual Union County College Bridge Building Competition. The competition, which includes High Schools from Union, Middlesex, and Warren County, took place at Union County College on December 2, 2011. Sixteen high schools participated with twenty-five entries. The purpose of the competition is to encourage teamwork and higher order thinking skills to culminate in a Truss Bridge design that will hold the most weight but weigh the least. Aspiring designers and engineers work for weeks prior to the competition, designing, testing, and building model bridges. Seventeen Dwyer students participated, entering two novice and one advanced bridge.

There were twenty-five bridges entered in the Novice Category with John Dwyer Technology Academy placing 1st and 2nd. The winning bridge weighed in at 554 grams and held up 225 pounds. The second place bridge weighed in at 721 grams and held up 255 pounds. In the Advanced Category, seventeen bridges competed with Dwyer's entry placing 5th.

iLeap Care Center

The iLeap Care Center at Dwyer Technology Academy was created to support students, teachers and team members with technical support as well as training for their iPads, Mac books and notebooks.

The center will be operated by Elizabeth Public Schools' Information Technology (IT) Team members. This unique concept to the school environment mimics the Genius Bar or Geek Squad functions provided by large scale




students tasted were spaghetti squash, zucchini, (white, red and sweet) potatoes, cantaloupe and honeydew.

RECOMMENDED: That the Revised Suicide Awareness and Prevention Policy, Regulation and Exhibits (File Code No. 5141.6), as attached, be approved.

Policy

SUICIDE AWARENESS AND PREVENTION POLICY

The Elizabeth Board of Education recognizes that depression and self-destruction are problems of increasing severity among children and adolescents. A student under severe stress cannot benefit fully from the educational program and may pose a threat to herself/himself or others. The Board wishes to ensure that appropriate awareness and prevention programs are implemented and continued in the district.

The Board therefore directs the Chief School Administrator to develop and implement a comprehensive suicide awareness program for the district. To accomplish this in accordance with N.J.S.A. 18A:6-111, the Chief School Administrator shall prepare procedures and programs for Board adoption, which will:

- A. Provide comprehensive on-going suicide awareness and prevention programs for the school district to include the developmental stages of children and adolescents, early warning signs of suicide, causes of suicide, how to handle post traumatic issues and the identification of community resources.
- B. Require all teaching staff to complete two documented hours of instruction in suicide prevention as part of the required 100 clock hours of professional development. Such instruction must be provided by a licensed healthcare professional with training and experience in mental health issues.
- C. Provide for notification of parent/guardian when a student is determined to be self-destructive.
- D. Provide and arrange an immediate referral to a local child/adolescent mental health facility for an evaluation and recommendations.

All potentially suicidal students should be referred to an independent psychiatric service for evaluation and recommendations. In the event that the parent/guardian objects to the recommended evaluation or indicates an unwillingness to cooperate in the best interest of the student, the school shall contact the New Jersey Division of Youth and Family Services to request that agency's intervention on the student's behalf.

The student shall not return to school without appropriate written documentation (hospital psychiatric emergency room discharge documentation or Potential Suicide Attempt (PSA) form) indicating that student was seen by a psychiatrist/licensed mental health professional. Both forms must clearly indicate that the student does not require hospitalization at this time.

Upon return to school the student must be accompanied by parent/guardian and both must meet with the Principal and mental health crisis team member making the original referral. This meeting is mandatory prior to being admitted to school.

The Chief School Administrator shall also develop appropriate administrative regulations for the implementation of the program and insure the dissemination of these regulations to staff, students and parents/guardians.

SUICIDE AWARENESS AND PREVENTION PROGRAMS

The Elizabeth Board of Education recognizes that self-destructive behavior is increasing among children and adolescents in this country. Students who experience depression are unable to benefit fully from the educational program of the school. Moreover, a student who attempts suicide poses a danger both to self and possibly to others.

Student confidentiality is not upheld when the student threatens himself/herself or others. In these cases no matter what guarantees of privacy have been given the student, the information must be discussed with the appropriate personnel.

In cases where parents/guardians refuse to cooperate, the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) shall be contacted by the principal/house director or his/her designated staff. The Board of Education directs that all school personnel be alert to the warning signs of childhood and adolescent suicide, and the procedures to follow in the event of a threat, an actual attempt or completion.

Introductory Guidelines

School personnel must take all suggestions, demonstrations, or communications of suicide seriously. School personnel also must increase their sensitivity to and awareness of the subtle signs of suicidal ideation and/or self-destructive behavior. When confronted with life-threatening behavior or when suicide ideation is present, an immediate mobilization of appropriate resources is essential. In any such situation a commitment to student confidentiality must be superseded by life-saving intervention steps.

At the beginning of every school year, the principal will identify and appoint if necessary, the members of the school mental health crisis team. This team will be comprised of the principal, or vice principal, the guidance counselor, substance awareness coordinator, school nurse, non-classroom teacher, school social worker and a parent liaison.

Behaviors Indicative of Possible Suicidal Ideation

There are numerous possible signs and symptoms associated with a suicide attempt and/or completion. At times just one sign is evident; other times a combination of signs are associated with suicide.

Listed below are some signs and symptoms. This list is by no means complete or exhaustive. However, it should assist with the identification of children and adolescents at risk for suicide.

- A. Family problems, i.e., broken home, death of parent/guardian, alcoholism, and physical or sexual abuse
- B. Deteriorating peer relationships
- C. Inability to form peer relationships
- D. Broken romance
- E. Preoccupation with death
- F. Suicidal ideation in creative writing assignments (apparent in 95% of cases)
- G. Verbal statements of wish to die, worthlessness, sense of failure, isolation, absence, or death, or art project displaying the same themes

- H. Deterioration in school performance
- I. Inability to concentrate
- J. Drop in academic achievement, inability to focus on studies
- K. Depression, boredom, apathy, fatigue, prevailing sadness
- L. Neglected personal hygiene, unkempt appearance
- M. Thrill-seeking behaviors (even if self-destructive), drug abuse, reckless driving, etc.
- N. Acting-out behavior (onset of socially unacceptable behavior)
- O. Atypical eating/sleeping habits either excessive increase or decrease
- P. Giving away personal possessions
- Q. Collecting pills, razor blades, knives, ropes or firearms
- R. Previous suicide attempts

Response to Suicidal Ideation/Student has Voiced or has Written an Intent to Engage in a Suicidal Act

A professional staff member who has reason to believe that a student has self-destructive tendencies shall notify the principal. The principal shall require a member of the mental health crisis team (school social worker, substance awareness coordinator, school nurse or guidance counselor) to meet and assess the student.

- A. If, after being interviewed by a crisis team member, it is determined that suicidal ideation does not exist, it is still necessary to adhere to the following procedure:
 - 1. The principal or his/her designee will telephone the student's parent/guardian at home or work to inform the parent/guardian of the situation. Document the telephone conversation on the Crisis Contact Form.
 - 2. If the student is a classified student, the crisis team will notify the case manager.
 - 3. Keep the crisis team informed of any and all developments in the matter including the parent/guardian's reaction to the contact.
 - 4. The crisis team member shall notify the professional staff member making referral of the outcome of the referral.
- B. If a crisis team member determines that suicidal ideation does exist, adhere to the following:
 - 1. Notify parent/guardian and instruct them to come to school immediately.
 - 2. Contact Trinitas Regional Medical Center New Point Campus, 655 East Jersey Street, Psychiatric Emergency Room Crisis Screener at (908) 994-7131 and inform the screener of the situation. Complete crisis referral form and fax form to screener. Obtain contact information from screener.
 - 3. If there is reason to believe that the parent/guardian will have difficulty following through with the referral to Trinitas Regional Medical Center or their private clinician, inform the parent/guardian that the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) can and will be contacted in order to ensure that the student receives the appropriate services. If it is determined that the parents/guardians are uncooperative and will not follow through when the danger of a potential suicide is evident, call the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) at (908) 820-3000.

- 4. Inform the parent/guardian that if they are taking the student to the hospital emergency room they must obtain a discharge form. Give the parent a copy of the crisis referral form. If the parent is taking the student to a private clinician, then inform the parent that the Potential Suicide Attempt (PSA) form must be completed. Give the parent/guardian a PSA form which must be completed by a psychiatrist/licensed mental health professional. Obtain contact information for private clinician from parent/guardian and contact private clinician. Fax crisis form to private clinician.
- 5. The principal will notify the Chief School Administrator of actions taken and follow-up procedures by submitting an incident report.
- 6. Prior to being admitted back to school, ensure that the student has **appropriate** written documentation (hospital discharge papers or PSA form) and that a meeting is held between student, parent/guardian, principal, and crisis team member. Crisis follow up form is completed at meeting. If the student is classified, the case manager will be part of this meeting.
- 7. The PSA form signed by a psychiatrist/licensed mental health professional or psychiatric emergency room discharge document must be obtained prior to the student being readmitted to school. Psychiatric emergence room discharge forms and PSA forms shall be kept in a secured confidential file in the principal's office.

Response to a Suicide Attempt – Physical Attempt

If a suicide attempt is made on school premises, the principal shall notify the school nurse who will ensure that emergency medical treatment is provided. The student shall be kept under close observation by the school nurse at all times. If the student is difficult to control, the police shall be called for assistance.

- A. The principal shall then:
 - 1. Confer with the nurse to assess whether an ambulance is needed.
 - 2. Inform the Assistant Superintendent for Schools and the appropriate supervisor.
 - 3. Notify the parent/guardian to come to school immediately.
 - 4. In the absence of the school nurse, the principal or his/her designee will remain with the student, call for an ambulance if necessary (911), and accompany the student to Trinitas Regional Medical Center, New Point Campus, 655 East Jersey Street, Psychiatric Emergency Room.
 - 5. Apprise the Assistant Superintendent for Schools of all actions taken and follow up procedures by submitting the required incident report.
 - 6. Prior to being admitted back to school, ensure that the student has appropriate written documentation (hospital discharge papers) and that a meeting is held between student, parent/guardian, principal and crisis team member. If the student is classified, the case manager will be part of this meeting. All documents pertaining to the hospitalization/emergency room visit must be kept in a confidential file in the principal's office.
 - B. The nurse will:
 - 1. Do a physical assessment and administer first aid.
 - 2. Keep the student in the medical office until appropriate arrangements are made.

- 3. Make the arrangements for an ambulance, if needed, and accompany the student to Trinitas Regional Medical Center, New Point Campus, 655 East Jersey Street.
- 4. Inform parent/guardian of procedure for student to return to school, documentation noting that student does not require hospitalization and meeting requirement.

Follow-up Procedures

- A. Students returning to school:
 - 1. The principal and crisis team member will meet with the student and parent/guardian and secure the appropriate documentation (hospital/emergency room discharge documentation). Crisis follow up form is completed at meeting. If the student is classified, the case manager will be part of this meeting.
 - 2. The principal will notify and inform the school nurse that the student has returned to school and the appropriate documentation has been secured.
 - 3. The student will be assessed and monitored by a member of the school crisis team (school social worker, substance awareness coordinator or guidance counselor) for as long as needed.

Postvention: Procedures in the Event of a Completed Suicide/Homicide

If news of death by suicide is received, the principal or his/her designee shall verify the information with the family and notify the Assistant Superintendent for Schools immediately.

If the news is received during school hours, the information must be verified with the family. Siblings and/or family members of the deceased should be identified. A determination should be made, with family input, as to the best way to inform siblings/family members and the course of action to be taken.

- A. All contacts with the news media should be referred to the Assistant Superintendent for Schools who will be responsible for assuring that they are handled in a manner intended to discourage sensational coverage of the tragedy.
- B. In an effort to responsibly deal with emotional reactions within the school community, goals will be:
 - 1. Rumor control;
 - 2. Provision of opportunity for students and staff to deal with their feelings;
 - 3. Decrease potential for contagion effect;
 - 4. Return to "a normal school day" in accord with the above guidelines.
- C. Once news of the tragedy is verified, the staff of a building should receive the same information. Information to staff should be disseminated at an emergency faculty meeting. The principal will call an emergency meeting in the morning before students arrive and/or the end of the school day to outline procedures to be followed during subsequent days. If news of the suicide is received over a weekend or vacation, an emergency faculty meeting will be conducted before the students arrive on the first school day. Secretarial staff should receive the information as well, as they are in frequent contact with other students and parents/guardians.

Under no circumstances should students be informed of the death in large assembly or over the school's public address system.

- D. During the emergency faculty meeting, the following steps will be carried out:
 - 1. The school social worker, substance awareness coordinator and the guidance counselor will compile a list of any students who were especially close to the deceased or who are otherwise considered to be at risk for self-destructive behavior. This list shall be reviewed to ensure that these students are given individual and group counseling during subsequent days. Parents/guardians of these students should be notified by the principal or his/her designee as to the availability of counseling programs.
 - 2. Special assistance shall be offered to teachers of the deceased, as well as any other school personnel who felt especially close to the deceased.
- E. Students should be allowed to leave class during the following day to obtain support offered by the school counseling staff. The principal will arrange for a "crisis center" to be available for students as needed. Siblings of the deceased in other school buildings should also be offered special assistance. School personnel and/or mental health workers should be available to meet with parents/guardians who may contact the school with expressions of concern.
- F. Community resources (i.e. Traumatic Loss Coalition, hospital and community mental health personnel) may be mobilized to assist school personnel in meeting with students and family members.
- G. To the extent possible, efforts should be made to ensure that the regular school routine is followed. Students should be given an option to attend the funeral.
