John E. Dwyer Technology Academy Receives \$10,000 Grant from Lowe's



On Friday November 19, 2010, students and teachers from Elizabeth Public Schools' *SkillsUSA* club accepted a \$10,000 grant from Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation. The grant was given to support the club's ongoing community service project called *The Oyster Project*.

The Oyster Project is a multi-disciplinary approach to learning science and mathematics, using technology to accelerate the learning process. The goals of the project are to create an oyster farm in order to learn about the history of the waterways around the New York/New Jersey metropolitan areas; to study the relationship between nature and science; and assess the impact of a community on natural resources. The Lowe's grant will enable SkillsUSA students from John E. Dwyer Technology Academy to monitor the local ecosystem and waterways using remote and local instrumentation systems, so they can eventually reintroduce oysters into the Arthur Kill waterway. The equipment measures PH, salinity, turbidity, dissolved oxygen, local weather and other sensors.

Skills USA is a national nonprofit organization of students, teachers and industry, working together to ensure America has a skilled work force. The organization helps high school and college students enrolled in career and technical education programs to excel by teaching employability skills such as communication, problem solving and leadership in conjunction with their trade, technical and service occupation skills. The Elizabeth Public Schools' chapter of Skills USA operates under the direction of teacher advisors Roger Osgood and Lilia Chaika.

Larry D. Stone, Chairman of Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation stated, "By supporting local schools like Elizabeth's John E. Dwyer Technology Academy, we believe we are not only investing in community projects that are important to our customers and employees, but we're also helping schools build a stronger foundation for the students who will be tomorrow's employees, homeowners and community leaders."

Algebra teachers Abby Hersch and Kristi Godfrey saw the commitment of their students and the understanding they developed having had the opportunity to see a real world application of algebra.

"We learned, we ate and we shared. 'The Muffin Project' was the perfect plan to work together, to learn algebra, eat muffins and to think about donating to a charity. The best experience of learning and sharing," exclaimed eighth grade student Genesis Gazo.

Language Arts teacher Mrs. Jones guided the students in their persuasive letters, and created a bulletin board for the students' writing summing up the entire experience, "When Math and Language Arts Get Together, it's Delicious."



Eighth Grade Archeologists Connect the Present with the Past



"No other discipline has its portals so wide open to the general public as history." These were contemplative words by Johan Huizinga. These words relate to *The Terence C. Reilly School No. 7 Eighth Grade Cave Exhibit*. Students are opening the portals of history for the school community to understand the prehistoric period of man. It is crucial to know the history to observe the progression of humans on earth.

The exhibit will demonstrate prehistoric times using many student-made artifacts. There will be replicas of cites such as Catal Huyuk, the most ancient city discovered by archeologists, as well as scale models of the people's culture showing their environment, hunting and farming skills. Also included are replicas of prehistoric people such as the African "Lucy" skeleton, and the European "Ice Man". These replicas are mixed from the Paleolithic and Neolithic Ages, the most widely known eras of prehistoric times, which were very diverse since in the Paleolithic Age people were nomads, moving from place to place in order to survive. In the Neolithic Age, however, people discovered how to farm, which led them to a more stationary lifestyle.

Technology played an important role in prehistoric people's lives by helping them survive, making their lives easier and entertaining them. Therefore the exhibit includes many examples of tools, paintings, pottery and jewelry. Students recreated hand axes, daggers, grinders, and cave paintings. These technological artifacts were accompanied by highly informative placards, communicating the age, use, and significance of each item.

Finally, to make the exhibit experience more exciting and entertaining the eighth grade students of Terence C. Reilly School No. 7 included interactive activities for visitors.
