AVID Students Visit Kean University

A Visit to Liberty Hall Museum



Elmora School No. 12's seventh grade students had the opportunity to travel back in time to the early days of colonial New Jersey. Social Studies teachers Ms. Dorta and Mr. Price took their students to Liberty Hall Museum on January 26, to experience *From Crown to Country*, a special program presented by Liberty Hall. The Museum allowed students to learn about the area they live in and its unique role in the Revolutionary War. Students participated in a musket drill, explored the Liberty Hall's first two floors which included a room in

which Mrs. Washington slept and learned about the ghost of Hannah Caldwell. They viewed maps from all different time periods and even had the opportunity to sign an oath to King George III, the colonies, or pledge for peace with the Quakers using a quill pen and ink.

Students were excited to view so many of the things they had learned about the Revolution. They made connections and discovered the vital role that New Jersey played during the formative years of the United States. It was a wonderful way to history.

Using Technology.... “Flipping” Classes



Mr. Louis Sobo, History teacher at **Elizabeth High School** Upper Academy, is “flipping” his classes. From February 6th - February 17th, students will actually view his lectures before they come to class and use traditional class time to work on assignments that students would normally do at home. Classwork becomes homework and homework becomes classwork. Traditional classroom routines are flipped.

Mr. Sobo video recorded his lectures relevant to the curriculum and posted them on You Tube. Students access lectures, utilizing their personal mobile devices and through Internet access, both from home and on the go. When students come to class, Mr. Sobo is available to personalize the instruction and facilitate the completion of student assignments.

Kyla Flores, a student in Mr. Sobo's 2nd period US history class, says the method helps her with key concepts because she can go back and replay the lectures again and again.

Christian Villa claims that his time is used more efficiently because he can watch the lectures on his way to jazz concerts and extra-curricular activities.

Mr. Sobo is hoping to delve deeper into the big concepts in his class because of his ability to devise more rigorous tasks that ask higher level questions. For example, the 6 assignments that go with the lecture series require students to create a one act play, analyze primary sources, and interpret art from the historical period that students are studying. The teacher is more available to answer student questions and assist in the completion of student work. His time lecturing is reduced by 80% freeing him to offer more direct feedback to students. He describes it as a win-win for students and teachers with overwhelming support from his six classes of US History I.

Librarian Visits School No. 13

On Friday, January 13, 2012 **Benjamin Franklin School No. 13** students enjoyed a visit from Melinda Elichko from the Elizabeth Public Library. She read to 1st and 2nd grade classes two books; “Library Lion” and “Library Lil”. The readings were interactive and followed with a discussion of the stories. It culminated with a theatrical show that all of the students had a part in. The visit was coordinated by Mary Ann Davies, the school Librarian at School No. 13. Everyone hopes Mrs. Elichko will come back soon for another visit.



Studying Cold Climates

Throughout the month of January Mrs. Perez's Kindergarten class at **Ronald Reagan Academy School No. 30** studied about different Arctic animals and learned about how they live in very cold climates.

The students created non-fiction texts about Penguins and learned about the elements of a *True Snowflake*.




A Science Challenge

Healthy Harvest








"La Befana"
