HEALTHY LEAP INTO SUMMER 2013



On May 30, 2013, Elizabeth Public Schools held its sixth annual *Healthy Leap into Summer* health expo in collaboration with organizers Gateway Regional Chamber of Commerce President, James R. Coyle and Trinitas Regional Medical Center Vice President of Clinical Services, Nancy DiLiegro, PhD. She also shared with students her personal struggle in achieving and maintaining a healthy weight. Vox challenged students to get up, get moving and get healthy.

Board of Education President Tony Monteiro, board members Charlene Bathelus and Francisco González, and Superintendent Pablo Muñoz, were on hand to urge students to “take a healthy leap.” Mr. Monteiro commented, “The time and effort of the sponsors, exhibitors, and speakers in providing vital health information to our teens has made a lasting impact on our students’ quality of life.”

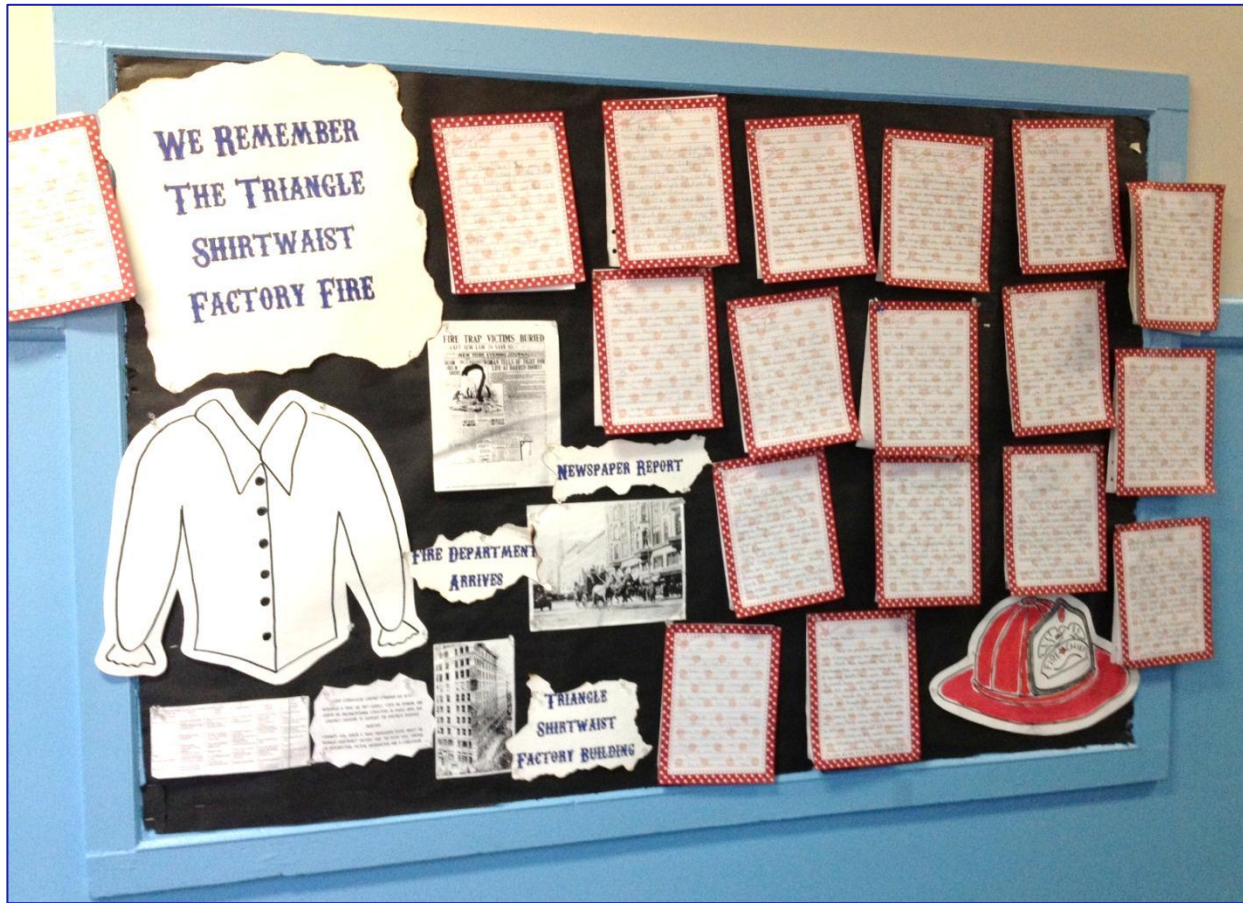
Exploring Different Countries

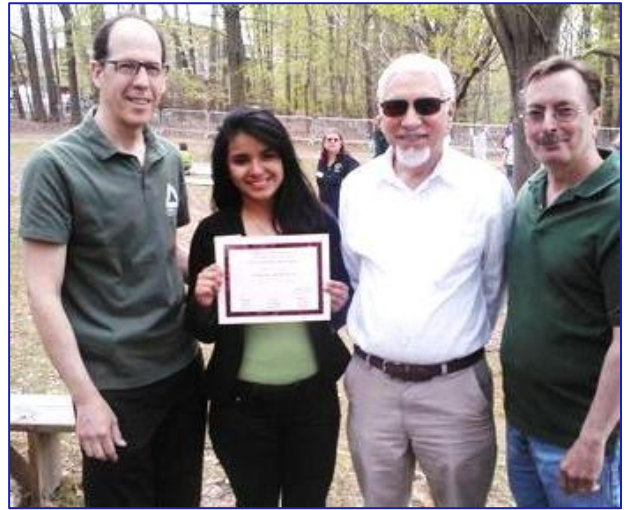
Earth Day Activity

WHEREAS, it shall be the responsibility of each public school district to provide the agreed upon technology which may include equipment, software, professional development and/or maintenance of equipment, and

WHEREAS, the Union County Educational Services Commission has agreed to administer the responsibilities associated with this program for the purpose of greater cost effectiveness through joint purchasing and centralized administration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Elizabeth Board of Education enter into an agreement with the Union County Educational Services Commission, whereby the Commission will administer the Non-public School Technology Initiative Program for non-public schools located within its boundaries for the 2013-2014 school year, and
